Spotlighting the challenges

The ecology of Western Port and its catchments and coastal regions has been significantly changed by historic events associated with European settlement. These adverse effects are still with us. The region is also subject to new challenges as Melbourne's population and business focus moves progressively eastward toward and around Western Port. The WPSP aims to raise the profile of these challenges and make them the subject of appropriate examination, debate and planned response.



Rampant coastal erosion near Lang Lang produces tonnes of slimy mud adding to the barren mudflats that once supported luxurious meadows of seagrass. What happened to the protective ring of mangroves and saltmarshes? Can the seagrasses recover whilst this erosion process continues?



Science not belief

The WPSP is a science – based organization and we promote good science and effective research to provide the basis for effective action. Part of our role is to challenge established beliefs because they can often enlarge problems and waste limited resources.

Putting Theory into Practice

Theoretical science provides broad foundations for success, but often the means for achieving the right outcomes in specific circumstances comes from field testing. The WPSP is not afraid of experimentation or failure; it believes that we learn from both success and failure, but inaction is generally unproductive.



A plug of replanted seagrass shows a positive response to treatment with osmocote fertilizer applied to the roots. However, high nutrients in the water column had adverse effects due to the stimulation of epiphytic growth (e.g. algae) which smother leaves and inhibit photosynthesis.

Working Together

The WPSP believes that the task of protecting Western Port is too big for one organization and the best outcomes will come from cooperative partnerships and building strong community involvement and ownership of the issues and actions. The WPSP also relies on the generosity of its sponsors and partners to help fund its projects.

As part of our commitment to Western Port these directors are active in providing advice and contributing to planning and strategic processes of key organizations in the region.




One fine example:
